Celebrate spring and "all things winged" at Wingding Family Fest on May 9 Free Family Event at Skyline Open Space Preserve

Los Altos, California – The Midpeninsula Regional Open Space District and the Santa Clara Valley Audubon Society (SCVAS) are sponsoring a free family festival offering kids of all ages fun hands-on activities involving birds, bats, insects, and nature.

Wingding Family Fest takes place on Saturday, May 9, 2015, 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., at the Skyline Ridge Open Space Preserve, located on Skyline Blvd. (Hwy 35), one mile south of Page Mill Rd./Alpine Rd./Skyline Blvd. junction.
